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CNS Celebrates its History

ommissionaires Nova Scotia (CNS) is celebrating 75 years of trusted security for Nova Scotians. January 24, 2013 marks the date 75 years ago (1938) that the first 20 commissionaires enrolled in the Corps. Since then, thousands of security-minded commissionaires in Nova Scotia have answered the call to protect people, property and information across the province. CNS has become one of Nova Scotia's largest employers, now providing work for 1,700 commissionaires, 1,200 of whom are veterans.

"On January 24th, and throughout this anniversary year, we are celebrating our people and their accomplishments," stated **Colonel Mike Brownlow**, CEO for CNS. "It is our diverse group of commissionaires, clients, staff and volunteer governors, and their outstanding dependability, loyalty and trust that has rewarded us a highly regarded reputation in the security industry."

Starting in November, 2012, CNS began presenting serving commissionaires with a special commemorative



ribbon bar in appreciation of their service during this 75th anniversary year. The ribbon has been designed to reflect the wide-ranging



experience and backgrounds

of those who make up CNS. Blue represents the Royal Canadian Navy, red for the Canadian Army, light blue for the Royal Canadian Air Force, gold for the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, and orange to represent other skilled veterans and non-veterans coming together to collectively serve Nova Scotians. By now most commissionaires should have been presented their anniversary ribbon and be wearing it proudly.

"CNS looks forward to serving Nova Scotians for the next 75 years and beyond," announced Col Brownlow.

Frank Cathcart, seen in left picture with Danielle Laroche, Manager for the Canadian Coast Guard College (CCGC) in Cape Breton was the very first commissionaire presented with the 75th Anniversary Commemorative Ribbon. Frank came to the Corps 18 years ago bringing a wealth of knowledge and experience from the Canadian Forces and his fishing career. Since joining, Frank has progressed from an entry level commissionaire to Chief Warrant Officer as Site Supervisor for CCGC. Providing his team with superb leadership, he represents the type of people and accomplishments we are celebrating this year.

Royal Canadian Legion Backpack Initiative

Many retired veterans live throughout Nova Scotia and occasionally life challenges arise where some need to reach out for assistance. CNS was saddened to learn about the number of veterans who are homeless throughout the province. CNS identified this worthy area for support with the help of Veterans Affairs Canada and the Canadian Forces Joint Personnel Support Unit. On December 5, 2012, CNS supported the Royal Canadian Legion's "Backpack Initiative" by making a donation to outfit ten backpacks. The backpacks are filled with basic necessities (ex. toiletries, blankets, grocery vouchers, first aid kits, transportation tickets, hats and gloves, etc.) and are available throughout the province free of charge to veterans who are experiencing shelter challenges. This assists them in bridging a gap until more permanent solutions can be worked out. While CNS is pained that such a basic need exists for veterans in Nova Scotia, it is very pleased to be able to contribute to this initiative.

Queen's Diamond Jubilee Medals

commemorative medal was created to mark the 2012 celebrations of the 60th anniversary of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II's accession to the Throne as Queen of Canada in 1952. The Queen Elizabeth II Diamond Jubilee Medal is a tangible way for Canadians to honour Her Majesty for her service to this country. At the same time, it serves to recognize and honour significant contributions and achievements by Canadians. During the year of celebrations, approximately 60,000 deserving Canadians were recognized.

Commissionaires Canada was allocated 80 of these medals to be distributed to its 16 Divisions. Based on the size of the Division, CNS received seven of these prestigious medals. Nominations were sought and received from CNS managers and supervisors throughout Nova Scotia. A vigorous selection process then took place, which included the CNS leadership team, the Governors' Human Resources Committee and the Governors' Executive Committee.

On September 6, 2012, CNS former Board Chair, and now Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia, Brigadier General The Honourable J.J. Grant, OMM, ONS, CD (Ret'd) hosted nearly 60 CNS guests as he presented Queen's Diamond Jubilee Medals to our seven selected commissionaires (see below picture).

Linda Lushington Award for Safety Excellence

Newly created this year, the Linda Lushington Award for Safety Excellence was established to recognize the CNS work site that best demonstrates commitment to safety in the workplace. Academic Upgrading

NS values continuous learning and training. While in-house this is demonstrated by our required refresher/update courses, we also encourage our commissionaires to seek outside educational opportunities that contribute to current areas of expertise or build new skill-sets. CNS has an academic upgrading program in which all serving commissionaires may apply for reimbursement of eligible courses. Applicants may be reimbursed up to 75% of the course tuition to a maximum of \$500 per year (\$2,000 lifetime total) upon successful completion of the course. To-date 28 commissionaires have taken advantage of this benefit with a combined reimbursement of \$7,634.63.

We congratulate **Michael MacMaster** of Halifax Port Authority, who has recently been awarded a \$500 reimbursement for completing Continuing Educational Units toward his Canadian Addiction Counsellors Certification at the Institute on Addiction Studies.

A Blast from the Past

s we take time to reflect CNS' achievements and milestones over the past 75 years, we must look beyond the organization and to the individuals who make up Commissionaires Nova Scotia. This section of *Corps Rapport* explores several individuals' stories we wish to feature. We recognize that under every uniform there is a wealth of personal accomplishments and tales represented by all serving commissionaires past and present.

It's all in the Family

A famous ship named *The Bluenose* (and its replicated sister ship *The Bluenose II*) has become a symbolic representation of our province's character and history. Being shaped by the sea, fishing, ship-building, and sailing are traits Nova Scotia is known for across Canada and around the world. An image made notorious by our dimes and license plates, *The Bluenose* holds a special place in our hearts.


This September, *The Bluenose II* made its greatly anticipated re-launch in Lunenburg after its two year long "restoration". Originally launched in the summer of 1963, the schooner was designed as a replica to *The Bluenose*, a distinguished racing and fishing ship.

Closely tied to this ship's history is one of our commissionaires, **Michael Stanbury**, who works at Lockheed Martin. Michael took part in the original launch by writing and performing his tune "The Bluenose Song" with his singing trio almost 50 years ago. Stanbury's group, the Townsmen Trio, reconvened for a special performance of the song this September in celebration of the rebuild.

A fascinating connection we haven't yet mentioned is that Michael's grandfather is Colonel Sidney Oland, who originally built *The Bluenose II* in 1963. The Oland family primarily used the ship to market their Schooner beer; in fact, the launch of *The Bluenose II* was not Michael's first opportunity to write popular songs, he had already written three songs for Olands beer ads.

We must mention another remarkable connection to Michael's grandfather, Colonel Oland – he is the founder of the Nova Scotia Division of the Canadian Corps of Commissionaires. While an accomplished businessman and leader in many industries in Nova Scotia, one of his passions came from his significant military experience. Colonel Oland was CNS' first Commandant and first Chairman of the Board of Governors. Laying the foundation for CNS while providing superb direction, he remained Chairman for 36 years until 1971. Also linked to this family tree is **Commander Richard Oland**, a current CNS Board Governor, another grandson of Col Oland's and singer Michael's first cousin.

So what does *The Bluenose II* and Commissionaires Nova Scotia have in common? Strong family ties and a rich history that contributes to Nova Scotia's character. May we never forget our roots and the individuals along the way that have influenced the legacy known today as Commissionaires Nova Scotia.

A Tribute to "Twig" - Seven Decades of Lacrosse

In August this past summer, one of our own Commissionaires was inducted into the Cornwall Sports Hall of Fame for the sport of lacrosse. While nicknamed "Twig" as a player, we know him as **Don McElhone**, one of our security guards for Province House in Halifax. On December 4, 2012, the Honourable Bill Estabrooks, MLA for Timberlea-Prospect, moved the adoption of the following resolution in provincial legislature in recognition of Sergeant McElhone:

"Whereas one of the security staff of this House of Assembly, Sergeant Donald Roy McElhone of Commissionaires Nova

Scotia, has been a player, coach, and legend in the sport of lacrosse, having played games in seven different decades, starting in the 1950s, and is still coaching today; and

Whereas Don, or "Twig" as he was known in the sport - I see the resemblance - had a stellar start in Ontario with the Cornwall Wildcats as starting goalie, including the season in which his team went undefeated, including 18 games in which he played goalie and two games - wait for it, Mr. Speaker - in which he played forward, scoring two goals and four assists, and won the Ontario championship; and

Whereas after going on to spend 25 years playing senior lacrosse in Nova Scotia, as well as coaching at various levels in this province, at a ceremony held on August 11, 2012, Don was inducted into the Cornwall Sports Hall of Fame in recognition of all of his accomplishments in the sport of lacrosse;

Therefore be it resolved that the Nova Scotia House of Assembly recognize the lifetime achievements of Donald McElhone in the sport of lacrosse, congratulate him on his well-deserved induction into the Cornwall Sports Hall of Fame, and thank him for his decades of dedication to the sport, which he loves and for which he has done so much, as a coach and a mentor for others."

The motion was carried, complete with standing ovation. Don, congratulations on this incredible achievement!

n December 12, 2012, the Honourable Senator Jane Cordy of Dartmouth, Nova Scotia, moved the following motion in the Senate of Canada:

and present members and their high standards of dependability, loyalty and trust have created a highly regarded reputation in the security sector."


