

# April 8, 2024 - Total Solar Eclipse



A total solar eclipse will take place at the Moon's ascending node on Monday, April 8, 2024, visible across North America and dubbed the **Great North American Eclipse** (also **Great American Total Solar Eclipse** and **Great American Eclipse**) by some of the media. A solar eclipse occurs when the Moon passes between the Earth and the Sun, thereby obscuring the image of the Sun for a viewer on Earth. A total solar eclipse occurs when the Moon's apparent diameter is larger than the Sun's, blocking all direct sunlight, turning day into darkness. Totality occurs only in a narrow path across Earth's surface, with the partial solar eclipse visible over a surrounding region thousands of kilometres wide.

Occurring only one day after perigee (the point in the orbit of the moon or a satellite at which it is nearest to the earth ) on Sunday, April 7, 2024, the Moon's apparent diameter will be 5.5% larger than average. With a magnitude of 1.0566, its longest duration of totality will be of 4 minutes and 28.13 seconds near the Mexican town of Nazas, Durango, (about 4 mi (6 km) north), and the nearby city of Torreón, Coahuila.

This eclipse will be the first total solar eclipse to be visible in the provinces of Canada since February 26, 1979, the first in Mexico since July 11, 1991, and the first in the U.S. since August 21, 2017. It will be the only total solar eclipse in the 21st century where totality will be visible in Mexico, the United States, and Canada. It will also be the last total solar eclipse visible in the Contiguous United States until August 23, 2044. (Learn more on page 4)

# In Memoríam Colonel James Forsyth, CStJ, CD, CA

It is with great sadness that the Forsyth family announces the passing of Colonel (Ret'd) James Charles Forsyth, CStJ, CD, CA, on 11 January 2024, at the age of 85. Born in Hamilton on 1 June 1938, the son of the late Maurice & Lillian (Denver) Forsyth. James was a graduate of Central Secondary School in Hamilton and the Institute of Chartered Accountants. While at Central, he served 5 years with 2401 Central Secondary School Cadet Corps in Hamilton, then joined the Royal Canadian Army Service Corps (Militia) in 1957 as an Officer Cadet. Throughout an impressive 50-year career in the Canadian Militia, he served as Officer Commanding of 133 Company RCASC, Commanding Officer of the Royal Hamilton Light Infantry (RHLI), Commanding officer of 23 (Hamilton) Service Battalion and the Commander of the Hamilton Militia District (HMD). In between commands, he served in various appointments with Central Milita Area Headquarters, HMD Headquarters and National Defense Headquarters in Ottawa. His final appointment was as the Honorary Colonel (HCol) of the RHLI, retaining that appointment until 2007, after 14 years.

As HCol, James was a tireless campaigner for the RHLI, both in Canada and overseas on numerous regimental trips to France, Holland and Belgium for World War II memorial functions. He was also a member of the Dieppe Veterans' Memorial Park committee, leading to the construction and dedication of a long-overdue monument that pays tribute to veterans of The Royal Hamilton Light Infantry and other Hamilton area veterans who participated in the raid on Dieppe, France in August 1942. The monument was dedicated in August 2003.

Career highlights from his Militia service include being called out to assist civilian authorities in the search for 10-yearold Marianne Schuett in 1967, the blizzard of 1977 and being invited to have dinner at Buckingham Palace with His Royal Highness Prince Philip, the Colonel-in-Chief of the RHLI.

James was a member of the Board of Directors with the Canadian Corps of Commissionaires (Hamilton Division) from 1994 to 2018. Jim filled positions of Director, Treasurer, 2nd Vice Chair, Vice Chair and Chair.

He will be remembered as a true gentleman, kind, loving and generous friend, and dedicated family man. He will be missed dearly.

## TOTAL ECLIPSE EVENT - APRIL 8, 2024

On April 8, 2024, a total solar eclipse will cross Mexico, the United States, and Canada. Except during the brief total phase of a total solar eclipse, when the Moon completely blocks the Sun's bright face, it is <u>not safe</u> to look directly at the Sun without specialized eye protection for solar viewing. This partial eclipse is expected to last from 2:15 p.m. to 4:45 p.m. on April 8, with a total eclipse scheduled for around 3:30 p.m. All commissionaires need to understand the risks while driving during an eclipse; especially since the time frame of this event is coinciding with travel to, or from, work. In addition, there are some employees who, by virtue of their work will be in a vehicle conducting patrols.

# Safe Solar Eclipse Viewing

A solar eclipse occurs when the moon partially or totally covers the sun. It is fascinating but it is important to guard against damage to your eyes.

## 1. Safety First

Use approved solar eclipse viewers that meet international standard ISO 12312-2. Glasses distributed by Hamilton Public Library are provided by McMaster University Faculty of Science, Department of Physics and Astronomy and meet these standards. Make sure the glasses are not damaged or scratched before Use. **Sunglasses, even those with a very dark tint, are NOT sufficient protection.** 

## 2. Don't Get Burned

Staring at the sun without protection may cause damage to your retina (the tissue at the back of your eye). This damage can occur without any sensation of pain. The injury can be temporary or Permanent.

#### 3. Watch Online hpl.ca/eclipse-live

Watch an online livestream from a verified source such as NASA Live. Or check out a recording of the eclipse after it has happen

The following practices should be adhered to when driving during an eclipse:

- Don't stare at the eclipse while you drive
- Don't wear eclipse glasses while driving
- \* Eclipse glasses with solar filters are designed to block out 99.9 percent of light. They are not to be worn when driving.
- Don't pull over by the side of the road
- \* Because other drivers may be distracted during the eclipse and could accidentally swerve onto the

shoulder, it is recommended that you park in a safe space away from traffic to observe the event.

- Keep your headlights on
  - \* During the eclipse, the moon will temporarily block out the sun, so areas around the eclipse will suddenly be very dark. Keep your headlights on instead of relying on automatic headlights.
- Drive slowly, and keep plenty of space between you and other cars
  - \* Expect your fellow drivers to be distracted. Drive slowly and <u>maintain additional distance</u> between you and other cars to give yourself space to avoid possible collisions with other vehicles.








# **Commissionaires Hamilton Employee**


- \* Getting prepared for this site was a lot of fun. Between the training from the client and from the Commissionaires this allows me to be prepared for what I have to do day to day.

# **Commissionaires Hamilton Milestone Award - Director of HR**

As of April 1, 2024, Commissionaires Hamilton will be introducing an expansion to our Divisional Awards, recognizing hours worked on behalf of the organization. Employees shall be entitled to monetary awards at every '10,000 hours of work' milestone, beginning at a \$100.00 award and increasing by \$100.00 for every stage.


